



COPELAND REPORT

Methodology:

- Survey of n=500 respondents with a max margin of error of +/-4.4 percent at a 95 percent confidence interval.
 - Respondents were Copeland residents and eligible to vote in UK General Elections.
 - Minimum quotas set by age, gender, region, education, occupation, tenure and ethnicity, and data weighted where necessary to ensure it is representative of the constituency.
 - Telephone poll between 3rd – 5th August.
 - Soft voters are those voters who are undecided or likely to change their mind. They are the key group of voters that will decide the election outcome.

Summary:

Voters in Copeland think that Brexit is the most important issue facing the country (42%) but they are unhappy with the Government's handling of the negotiations (77%).

Whilst most are aware of the Chequers Brexit Deal (76%) half of voters in Copeland oppose it (50%) with only 22% supporting the Deal.

Voters in Copeland expect it will have a negative effect on both the country (50%) and them and their families (47%).

Voters don't think it respects the EU Referendum results (51%), or that it is reflective of a true Brexit (43%).

Consequentially, respondents say that if their local Conservative MP supported the Chequers Deal, they would be less likely to support them at the next election (30%).
