

SWINDON SOUTH REPORT

Methodology:

- Survey of n=500 respondents with a max margin of error of +/-4.4 percent at a 95 percent confidence interval.
- Respondents were Swindon South residents and eligible to vote in UK General Elections.
- Minimum quotas set by age, gender, region, education, occupation, tenure and ethnicity, and data weighted where necessary to ensure it is representative of the constituency.
- Telephone poll between 7th 8th August.
- Soft voters are those voters who are undecided or likely to change their mind. They are the key group of voters that will decide the election outcome.

Summary:

Voters in Swindon South think that Brexit is the most important issue facing the country (50%) but they are unhappy with the Government's handling of the negotiations (70%).

Whilst most are aware of the Chequers Brexit Deal (81%) nearly half of voters in Swindon South oppose it (44%) with only 28% supporting the Deal.

Voters in Swindon South expect it will have a negative effect on both the country (50%) and them and their families (44%).

Voters don't think it respects the EU Referendum results (43%), or that it is reflective of a true Brexit (42%).

Consequentially, respondents say that if their local Conservative MP supported the Chequers Deal, they would be less likely to support them at the next election (28%).
