



CANTERBURY REPORT

Methodology:

- Survey of n=400 respondents with a max margin of error of +/-5.0 percent at a 95 percent confidence interval.
 - Respondents were Canterbury residents and eligible to vote in UK General Elections.
 - Minimum quotas set by age, gender, region, education, occupation, tenure and ethnicity, and data weighted where necessary to ensure it is representative of the constituency.
 - Telephone poll 8th September.
 - Soft voters are those voters who are undecided or likely to change their mind. They are the key group of voters that will decide the election outcome.

Summary:

Voters in Canterbury think that Brexit is the most important issue facing the country (43%).

Regardless of how they voted, most think that politicians should respect the result of the referendum and get on with the UK leaving the EU (53%).

Voters think that the issue has dragged on long enough and the sooner it is finished the better (73%).

They also believe that, regardless of an MP's personal views, the way their MP votes in Parliament should respect the referendum result (59%).

Consequentially, voters say that if their local MP blocked Brexit in Parliament and prevented the UK leaving the EU, they would be less likely to support them at the next election (41%).

Q) If a General Election was held today, what is the most important issue that would determine if and how you vote? That could be any local or national issue or political figure or party that is relevant to you in determining your vote if a General Election was held today.
